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Luton gets new funding to help bring disused historic buildings back to life

12 social enterprises and charities across the UK are being empowered to take over and transform at-risk high street buildings

Luton is to benefit from a share of a new £5 million fund empowering communities to breathe new life into their disused and at-risk historic buildings.

The grant will help the Culture Trust, Luton develop more dilapidated buildings in the Hat District and create a valuable range of new spaces for creative and community uses. Specifically, this funding will enable the re-animation of the Streetscape in Luton's Hat District in partnership with the Community, owners, partners, neighbours, artists and the creative Industries. Collectively and collaboratively, the Trust shall continue to strategically transform key heritage buildings in the Hat District.

The funding is being awarded as part of a new partnership between the **National Lottery Heritage Fund** and charity the **Architectural Heritage Fund**, to expand the Architectural Heritage Fund's Heritage Development Trust model across the UK. It follows the success of a pilot programme which supported seven social enterprises and charities in England to repair, restore and reuse at-risk high street and town centre buildings in their local areas.

As one of 12 new Heritage Development Trusts, The Culture Trust, Luton will receive a package of funding to help it scale up its operations to acquire and redevelop a pipeline of local historic buildings. It can also apply for grants to support early project development, and will be given guidance from consultants and mentors to develop its skills and knowledge alongside peer-to-peer support to expand their reach and influence.

Marie Kirbyshaw, Chief Executive of the Culture Trust, Luton said: "This is Luton's time to celebrate past and present cultures through transforming our Town Centre. We are thrilled to play our part in regenerating Luton's former hat and industrial heritage buildings for cultural purposes. We are thankful to AHF and the Heritage Fund for seeing Luton's Hat District potential and including us in this prestigious Heritage Development Trust national programme. We look forward to the next three years of partnership working, learning and achieving long-lasting results in Luton".

Robin Porter, Chief Executive of Luton Borough Council said: 'Another good news story for Luton as we transform our town centre. The Hat District is a key programme in our 2040 plans and we will continue to partner with the Culture Trust in caring for and re-using our Heritage Assets'.

Arts & Heritage Minister Lord Parkinson of Whitley Bay said: "Through its Heritage Development Trusts, the Architectural Heritage Fund has helped to breathe new life into old buildings across England, creating new jobs, homes, and opportunities. Organisations which have already benefited from Heritage Development Trust funding include not-for-profit Valley Heritage in Bacup, Lancashire which last year restored an empty Victorian bank building into a new co-working space and housing for homeless young people. Meanwhile, in Sunderland, Tyne & Wear Building Preservation Trust has transformed a row of Georgian merchants' houses once threatened with demolition into a vibrant music venue, coffee shop and bar.

Research by Historic England has found almost half of retail buildings in England and Wales, one third of offices and almost one in five industrial buildings are more than 100 years old. As many as 6,000 shops have become vacant in the last five years according to the BRC's Local Data Company vacancy monitor from this summer.
